How TikTok's Owners Are Putting Americans In Danger

I voted with an overwhelming number of my House colleagues this past week to require ByteDance, a company controlled by the Chinese Communist Party (CCP), to divest its ownership stake in TikTok. This bill is not intended to ban TikTok in the U.S., but to ensure that the CCP is not able to weaponize the app to spy on Americans, spread propaganda and lies throughout our society, influence our elections, or put our national security at risk. ByteDance has been using TikTok to spy, gather information, and collect vast amounts of personal and sensitive data on anyone who has the app. We simply cannot afford to let them continue to use this technology in this way.

This bill is designed to prevent not only China, but other foreign adversaries including Russia, Iran, and North Korea, from surveilling and manipulating Americans through online applications. Just as we cannot allow these nations to control our food and energy supplies, we cannot let them control our data to spy on our citizens and our government, or spread disinformation and propaganda throughout our country.

Introducing the Backcountry Aviation Protection Act

Backcountry Aviation Protection Act H.R. 7660

- Provides minimum altitude exceptions for standard training and bush flying safety maneuvers
- Shifts the burden of proof in minimum altitude enforcement actions from pilots to the FAA

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I'm proud to introduce my newest bill, H.R. 7660, the Backcountry Aviation Protection Act, which will help protect bush pilots across the West from unfair FAA enforcement action. Current regulations only permit pilots to fly below minimum altitude restrictions for takeoff and landing; when conducting off-airport landings in remote areas, however, these landings are typically preceded by low-level "inspection passes" to ensure that an area is actually safe to land – a practice that the FAA encourages pilots to perform.

But a recent FAA enforcement action has stripped a pilot of his license for performing an inspection pass, deciding that it was unsafe to land, and then diverting to a different, safer landing area. In other words, because he followed FAA guidance and prioritized safety, he now is being prosecuted for violating FAA minimum altitude regulations. My bill will amend these regulations to add inspection passes, go-arounds, and other common safety and training maneuvers as permitted exceptions. No pilot should make an unsafe landing that puts passengers, aircraft, or bystanders at risk, nor should they be punished by the FAA for making a choice that prioritizes safety.


Biden Can't Stand Trial, But He Can Run the Nation?

On Tuesday, the House Judiciary Committee held a hearing to investigate why Special Counsel Robert Hur did not recommend the filing of charges against President Biden for illegally taking, retaining, and sharing classified materials and documents. Time after time, Mr. Hur affirmed that President Biden was not exonerated by his report and that he "willfully and knowingly" kept these classified documents. Despite substantial evidence showing that Biden violated the law, Hur chose not to file charges because he found that Biden's memory is such that a jury may be reluctant to convict. According to Hur, Biden could not remember what year his son died, could not remember when he became Vice President, or when he left that office. Hur also found that Biden took such documents for the purpose of working with a ghost writer to draft his "memoirs."

My question is simple: if Biden is too incompetent to stand trial, then how is he competent to be President of the United States? That question has never been addressed, and the Democrats have worked hard to avoid it. I think the American people are entitled to an answer.

I took the opportunity to question Mr. Hur as to why it is that people like Joe Biden and Hillary Clinton are easily able to evade prosecution despite abundant evidence that they broke the law – Joe Biden having classified documents strewn about his garage, homes, offices, and closets; and Hillary instructing her underlings to use hammers to destroy phones and computers, while using "BleachBit" to erase other files. Again, while the Democrats would like to avoid delving into these issues, I believe all of you deserve an answer, and through my work on the Judiciary Committee and Select Subcommittee on Weaponization of the Federal Government I'm dedicated to unveiling the truth.

The Senate passed the bill on Friday in a 75-22 vote.

The USDA's electronic identification (EID) eartag mandate will expedite the vertical integration of our cattle industry, substantially increase our ranchers' operational costs, allow the USDA to dictate how our producers raise and care for their livestock (or deny access to the interstate markets), and make it easier for our government to demand the culling of herds to address "global warming" (just see what they did in Ireland). It is also clear that the federal employees responsible for drafting the EID mandate have no real-world experience as to how our ranchers handle, care for or manage either cattle or bison. USDA failed to follow the requirements for adopting this rule, and it should be stopped. Please see my letter to the Office of Management and Budget [here](#).

- Voted YES on [H.R. 1752](#), the *Eliminating Barriers to Rural Internet Development Grant Eligibility (E-BRIDGE) Act*, which authorizes economic development grants for high-speed broadband projects.
- Voted NO on [H.R. 886](#), the *Save Our Seas 2.0 Amendments Act*, which would have expanded the size and scope of the Administrative State.
- Voted YES on [H.R. 6276](#), the *Utilizing Space Efficiently and Improving Technologies (USE IT) Act*, which requires the Executive Branch to maintain building utilization rates of at least 60%, and to consolidate buildings or divest property in order to maintain that rate.
- Voted YES on [H.Res. 1065](#), which denounces the Biden Administration's immigration policies.
- Voted YES for [H.R. 7521](#), the *Protecting Americans from Foreign Adversary Controlled Applications Act*.

Cosponsored Legislation

Here are some highlights of [bills I'm cosponsoring](#):

- [H.R. 7109](#), the *Equal Representation Act*, which will amend the U.S. Census to include a citizenship question and apportion representatives based on the number of citizens, not persons, in the nation.
- [H.R. 6734](#), the *Stopping Unconstitutional Background Checks Act*, which blocks a proposed ATF rule to create universal background checks.
- [H.R. 6258](#), the *Guaranteeing Unalienable and Anatomical Rights for Dependents (GUARD) Act*, which blocks federal funding for states that discriminates against parents who oppose gender transition services, gender identity intervention, or related treatment.
- [H.R. 6052](#), the *21st Century Dyslexia Act*, which amends the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act* to provide greater educational considerations for children with dyslexia.

House approves appropriations package; bill includes \$15 million for electronic cattle tagging system

The House today approved a consolidated fiscal year 2024 appropriations bill that includes the Agriculture Department and the Food and Drug Administration. The Consolidated Appropriations Act 2024 (H.R. 1061) was considered on the suspension calendar, which required a two-thirds vote for adoption. The vote was 339-85.

The Senate passed the bill on Friday in a 75-22 vote.

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
