## Unleashing America's Energy Dominance

It was Energy Week in the House, and my Republican colleagues and I passed multiple bills and resolutions this week that affirm our commitment to ensuring America's energy independence and dominance, both now and for decades to come. Without our legacy energy industries, the United States can be neither a global superpower nor a sovereign nation. The actions of the Biden Administration continue to make us more beholden to foreign adversaries like China, Russia, Venezuela, and Iran for our energy while simultaneously destroying our role in the global marketplace.

While Biden continues to push his energy poverty agenda, House Republicans are committed to lowering your energy costs and increasing American energy production. This week, we denounced the Biden administration's anti-energy policies that are forcing your utility bills ever higher and gas prices through the roof, made clear that Americans oppose the idea of a "carbon tax", and passed two significant energy bills. The first, [H.R. 1121](#), prevents the President from unilaterally banning fracking, while [H.R. 6009](#), the Restoring American Energy Dominance Act – which I cosponsored – nullifies a Bureau of Land Management proposed rule that would have significantly restricted oil and gas production on federal lands.

## This Week in the Judiciary Committee

I have been working with the Judiciary Committee, and most specifically Subcommittee Chairman Rep. Thomas Massie, to hold a hearing on one of the most effective, insidious, and often overlooked ways in which the Administrative State distorts justice and threatens our government's separation of powers: the use of Administrative Law Courts (ALC) and Administrative Law Judges (ALJ). These agency-run courts were not created by Congress and exist outside of the Constitution's Article III Judiciary, yet they are the place where certain agencies bring a substantial portion of their enforcement actions against American citizens (think the SEC and IRS).

Yes, the same agencies that draft the regulations and then use the full weight of the federal government to enforce them, have their own courts in which to prosecute you. It will come as no surprise that these agencies have close to a 100% success rate before ALJs (with substantially less success when they have to proceed in an Article III court). We need to change how this system works and return to our foundation of a government "of, by and for the people." I am working on such reforms now, and will be introducing legislation in the near future designed to address not only the use of ALCs and ALJs, but other administrative law issues that are long overdue for review.

During our full committee markup on Thursday, I introduced and led debate in favor of H.R. 7187, the *Protection of Women in Olympic and Amateur Sports Act*. This straightforward, commonsense bill protects women's and girl's safety, health, and opportunity to excel in amateur and Olympic sports by ensuring they are not forced to compete against men and boys, yet the radical Democrats on our committee quickly devolved a meaningful debate into a denial that men are even competing in women's sports, and declaring that "we now know" that there are more than two sexes (with them being entirely incapable of defining a man or a woman). This insanity about simple biology not only denies reality but puts our daughters at risk of injury and abuse. We simply cannot tolerate the idea that men and boys should be allowed to compete against women and girls. H.R. 7187 will ensure that the true intent of Title IX is carried forward when it comes to athletics.

I also argued in favor of the PROVE IT Act, which would require federal agencies to disclose the actual financial cost of their regulations and how they disproportionately impact small businesses. All too often, agencies ignore or severely underestimate the negative impact their rules will have on small businesses, and on average, these agencies miss the actual direct cost by a whopping 40%. That figure does not even consider the indirect costs that Americans must absorb in complying with these agency new rules.

My current fight against USDA's EID eartag rule is a prime example: In 2013, USDA estimated that a fully implemented EID mandate would cost up AT LEAST \$1.2 billion dollars for livestock producers. Their most recent estimate now stands at \$26 million, not because the technology has become more affordable or the costs have come down, but the agency has ignored the vast majority of costs associated with the mandate and only publicized the cost of the actual EID button (or eartag); labor, EID readers, tracking technology, computer equipment, software, retrofitting and so much more that is necessary to implement this rule is simply written off as though they won't be required.

The USDA has also assumed that approximately 89% of the livestock producers will not be required to comply (being in states that have feedlots and packing plants, making it unnecessary to move the cattle and bison across state lines) – thereby admitting that the very purpose of the rule (traceability of livestock) cannot and will not be realized. The vast majority of our ranches and farms are considered small businesses, and many of which will not be able to weather these massive costs imposed on an industry that already endures tight profit margins. The PROVE IT Act would force the USDA to disclose the true cost of an EID mandate, thereby allowing the American people to understand the true cost of overregulation.

## One Step Closer to Blocking the Rock Springs RMP

I had the opportunity to participate in the Federal Lands subcommittee hearing this week to investigate the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) development of the Rock Springs Resource Management Plan (RMP) and the disastrous consequences it holds for Wyoming's communities and economy. In the multiple oversight and legislative hearings that have been held related to this calamitous RMP, we have continued to expose how the BLM spent years developing the plan's Alternative D – which seeks to balance grazing, recreation, energy production, and other land uses on millions of acres in Southwestern Wyoming – and only spent approximately 1 week to develop what is now this Administration's "preferred" Alternative B that would decimate all of the above industries and uses, and Alternative C that severely restricts recreational activities.

The BLM's RMP highlights the federal government's refusal to consider community needs, stakeholder input, state economies, energy security, food production, mining needs and other interests in their decision-making process. It demonstrates how unelected agency bureaucrats continue to take greater control of our resources to lock them up in order to prevent access, management and use by the Americans who truly own them. The BLM has signaled that it plans to undo our long-standing multiple-use policy for managing federal lands – a policy that is vital to our livestock, logging, recreation, hunting, fishing, mineral, and energy sectors. Ultimately, as I said in our hearing, the Biden administration intends to use this RMP to turn BLM lands into de facto National Parks and exclude local communities from harnessing the resources in our own backyard.
