This year has been one for the history books as America's 250th anniversary inspired celebrations from coast to coast. In the final newsletter of August, I want to reflect on all accomplished thus far in 2026:

Constituents First

One of the duties my office performs on your behalf is working as a liaison between individual Wyomingites and federal agencies. An example is helping people who have yet to receive their tax return from the IRS or their benefits from the VA. I am proud to report that my office has resolved nearly 1,200 cases this year, returning roughly \$2.5 million to constituents from various federal agencies.

If you are facing issues with a federal agency, whether it is the VA, Social Security, the IRS, or another department, my office may be able to help. Investing in Wyoming's Infrastructure

Each year, community project funding gives me the opportunity to request federal dollars for specific infrastructure projects that directly benefit Wyoming communities. For fiscal year 2027, I am proud to report that appropriators included over \$11 million of my community project funding requests across various fiscal year 2027 appropriations bills. This adds to the \$40 million I have already secured throughout my time in Congress, and I am hopeful to get this year's funding across the finish line.

14 Bills introduced

One of my core roles as your lawmaker is introducing legislation that benefits Wyoming. I arrived on Capitol Hill after more than 30 years in courtrooms, often litigating federal statutes. Understanding the fine details of the legislative process, how agencies design rules, and most importantly, what Wyoming needs from the federal government has driven me to introduce a wide range of legislation during my time in Congress. Below are the 14 bills and resolutions I sponsored this year, which brings me to a total of 56 pieces of legislation introduced to date in the 119th Congress.

1. [H.R. 7286](#) – Revokes the tax-exempt status of organizations performing or funding abortions.
2. [Domestic ORE Act](#) – Cuts red tape for mineral exploration on public lands by raising the acreage companies can explore under a simple notice from 5 to 25 acres.
3. [SAFE Act](#) – Enhances detection capabilities to combat chameleon carriers.
4. [H.R. 7695](#) – Nullifies the 2001 Clinton Roadless Rule and restores active, responsible forest management on National Forest System Lands.
5. [H.R. 7872](#) – Reforms bonus bids for coal producers on federal leases designed to cut upfront costs in half.
6. [Research and Oversight of AI in Courts Act of 2026](#) – establishes a task force of judicial experts to examine the integration of AI speech-to-text and automatic speech recognition (ASR) technologies in American courts.
7. [Stop Climate Shakedowns Act of 2026](#) – Prohibits retroactive climate liability lawsuits and other proceedings to implement or enforce an energy penalty law.
8. [H.R. 9277](#) – Prohibits courts from considering agency evidence that isn't based on reliable scientific principles and methods, cracking down on regulations built on flawed or cherry-picked data.
9. [H.R. 9278](#) – Requires courts to conduct an independent, de novo review of the facts whenever a federal agency imposes a sanction, rather than deferring to the agency's own fact-finding.
10. [Preventing AI Censorship Act](#) – Gives American citizens the right to sue federal employees who violate their First Amendment rights through the use of Artificial Intelligence.
11. [H. Res. 1374](#) – Calls on the Federal Communications Commission to modernize America's television content ratings system, so parents have the information they need to make informed viewing decisions for their children.
12. [H.J. Res. 202](#) – Nullifies the EPA's California waiver to enforce strict greenhouse gas standards on cars.

13. [H.R. 10090](#) – Implements a new excise tax on private colleges and universities that allow males to compete in women's sports.
14. [Strengthening Transportation Oversight and Preventing \(STOP\) Improper Licensing Act](#) – Requires federal safety regulators to audit states issuing non-domiciled commercial driver's licenses to illegal aliens and unqualified drivers.
