WYOMING'S CONGRESSWOMAN

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Hello Laura,

I am heading back to Washington, DC after spending a full week traveling throughout Wyoming, meeting with constituents and local governments, and holding townhalls.

My focus this coming week will be on working with my colleagues to quickly end another unnecessary Democrat-led government shutdown, while continuing to pursue policies that are in the best interests of both Wyoming and the Country as a whole.

Hearing Directly from Wyomingites

I enjoyed getting back on the road this past, traveling to Casper, Thermopolis, Sheridan and Buffalo. On Tuesday, I joined Natrona County residents at Casper College for a townhall.

I then toured the Fort Caspar Museum to learn more about the preservation of our state's rich history, while also discussing some of the challenges that the leadership faces to showcase this important community and state treasure. I also met with Patrick Kline to learn more about his ministry, Vision Beyond Borders. Representatives from the Wyoming Association of Irrigation Districts filled me in on issues associated with providing irrigation water to our farmers and ranchers, including the upcoming water year, and to describe long-term infrastructure needs.

I visited Thermopolis on Thursday for our Hot Springs County townhall. I also took this opportunity to meet with several Town of Thermopolis officials to discuss community priorities and infrastructure needs.

I wrapped up my week in Johnson County with a townhall in Buffalo, and met with Cornerstone Pharmacy and Arms to discuss pharmacy benefit managers, or PBMs. I also enjoyed touring the Jim Gatchell Museum, learning more about the history of the area. There is so much to explore in every community in Wyoming.

I am grateful to everyone who took the time to meet with me, attend a townhall, or share their perspective. Your input guides the work I do in Congress, and I remain committed to ensuring Wyoming's voices are heard. I also appreciate those individuals who have dedicated their careers to preserving Wyoming's rich heritage and history.

Ending Tax Breaks for Abortion Providers

I introduced legislation to revoke the tax-exempt status of organizations that perform or fund abortions. Groups masquerade as "charities" while profiting from ending innocent lives and even receive generous tax breaks in the process. Abortion is not health care, it is not compassionate, and it is certainly not a charitable cause worthy of special tax benefits. My bill amends the Internal Revenue Code to close this loophole and ensure that taxpayer dollars are never used to support the abortion industry.

Government Shutdown

As Friday turned into Saturday, the Senate Democrats led us into yet another partial government shutdown.

As the House, we did our job and passed all 12 appropriations bills before the January 30th deadline. These 12 bills were negotiated with the Democrats and between the House and Senate. The Democrats, however, are incensed that the President has been enforcing federal immigration law. They are holding the funding for the Department of Homeland Security. Their efforts to put criminals and illegal aliens over the interests of American citizens will not prevail as it was through our reconciliation package from last year that we have already provided substantial money for the hiring of more ICE and border security personnel, for deporting at least 1 million individuals who should not be here, and for completing construction of the wall, among other things.

My office has received questions about the Refugee and Entrant Assistance section on the House-passed HHS funding bill. This section provides \$5.1 billion to the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) and Administration for Children and Families (SCF) within HHS. The authorization of these offices falls under five different provisions in existing law.

ORR and SCF programs support refugees, asylees, Cuban and Haitian entrants, and trafficking victims become employed and self-sufficient. These programs also provide for the care of unaccompanied alien children in Federal custody and survivors of torture. As you may be aware, the unaccompanied alien children (UAC) program soared in costs under the Biden administration. However, as President Trump secured the border, costs have decreased and Congress reduced funding for the UAC program and fought for no new spending increases in the other programs in this latest funding authorization.

Protecting U.S. Citizenship

Last week, I joined my colleagues to file an amicus brief supporting President Trump's executive order ending birthright citizenship. The Constitution nor Congress grants citizenship to the children of noncitizens, including illegal aliens. We are seeking to defend the Constitution, reinforce that only Congress has the authority to define U.S. citizenship, and ensures the executive branch enforces the law as intended.

Decades of the misinterpretation of the Fourteenth Amendment and historical custom has created a mess when it comes to what it means to be a citizen. As just one example, the Chinese Communist Party has been exploiting the U.S. surrogacy system to essentially rent a womb in order to have a child with American citizenship. This dangerous practice needs to stop, which is why I am a cosponsor of the SAFE KIDS Act to protect children from trafficking and to safeguard American surrogate mothers and children.


