WYOMING'S CONGRESSWOMAN

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Hello Laura,

I spent much of last week in Washington, D.C. fighting for Wyoming's priorities through legislation, committee hearings, constituent meetings, and more. First, I introduced two bills to counter the U.S. Postal Service's (USPS) "Delivering for America" plan, which seeks to cut costs at the expense of rural communities. I am also proud to announce that two of my bills passed the House Natural Resources Committee. Finally, I participated in a Judiciary Committee hearing aimed at reining in our bloated bureaucracy—an issue I have stood against for years both as your representative and as a private attorney. You can rest assured that I will continue my work to ensure Wyoming's voice is heard on these critical issues.

Prioritizing Rural Mail Issues for Wyoming

Last week, I introduced two pieces of legislation aimed at preserving rural communities' access to reliable mail service, in addition to improving overall transparency within the USPS. My first bill, [H.R.1310](#), the Postal Operations Stay Timely and Local (POSTAL) Act, would prohibit the USPS from closing, consolidating, or downgrading Processing and Distribution Centers (P&DC) to Local Processing Centers if they are the only facilities in a state. This bill is a direct response to the USPS's attack on rural mail in our state, as the Delivering for America plan would downgrade Wyoming's only P&DCs and send the bulk of their processing operations out of state. I want to thank Senator Lummis for co-leading this bill in the Senate to protect Wyoming's mail.

When the USPS pursues a change that generally affects service on a nationwide basis, it is required by law to seek an advisory opinion from the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC). My second bill, [H.R.1249](#), the Instituting Notification Formalities on Reorganizing Mail (INFORM) Act, would require the USPS to submit a request for an advisory opinion from the PRC, to post a physical notice within impacted storefront postal facilities explaining the details behind the proposed changes. This would ensure that the public is informed about these issues that directly affect their mail service, while also allowing the opportunity for public input.

Two of My Bills Pass Natural Resources Committee

I am happy to inform you that on Wednesday, the Natural Resources Committee passed two of my bills. My first bill, [H.R.231](#), the Colorado River Basin System Conservation Extension Act, would extend the System Conservation Pilot Program (SCPP) until 2026, a program designed to explore solutions to address declining water levels and drought in the Colorado River Basin. The SCPP explores alternative methods to severe water regulation during droughts for the citizens of Wyoming. It is critical that we reauthorize this program and continue exploring hydrological conditions in the Colorado River Basin.

My second bill, [H.R.1001](#), would require the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) to analyze the economic consequences of drawing from the customer-funded Colorado River Basin Fund to implement the experimental actions called for in the July 2024 Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement Record of Decision. This would result in the BOR having to incorporate these costs into its annual budgeting. Once again, misguided policy is driving up the cost of energy for Western states—in this case for hydropower. There will be significant costs associated with cutting hydropower generation at Glen Canyon Dam to address smallmouth bass below the dam, to be paid for by utility customers. My legislation would help ensure that taxpayers are not left to foot the bill for the consequences of unsound endangered species and climate policies.
