
I have shared several updates below on the House Republican Majority's completion of Fiscal Year 2026 funding, cutting wasteful spending, demanding transparency and accountability in politically charged investigations, standing up for life, and fighting to protect Wyoming's energy jobs.

Completing FY 2026 Funding and Fighting Wasteful Spending

With the passage last Thursday of H.R. 7148—the Consolidated Appropriations Act—the House has now completed all 12 annual appropriation bills for Fiscal Year 2026, ahead of the January 30 funding deadline. By voting on this last set of four bills, we are showing what responsible governance can look like when Washington focuses on getting results for the American people. I am proud to be part of the Republican Majority returning to regular order.

We cut billions in wasteful Biden-era border crisis programs and defunded the NGOs who helped carry out the invasion of our country. The legislation also delivers directly for Wyoming as it includes every Community Project Funding request I submitted, with a total of \$25.8 million being provided to our local communities. Such monies will go toward rebuilding the Fort Laramie Canal tunnel, the Natrona County Airport Traffic Control Tower, and the Northern Arapahoe water treatment infrastructure, among other projects. We are also continuing to work on strengthening highway safety through English Language Proficiency enforcement and ensuring our rural communities and workforce receive the support they need.


Demanding Transparency in Politically Charged Investigations



During this week's Judiciary Committee hearing, I questioned former DOJ Special Counsel Jack Smith on his team's investigations and prosecutions of President Trump. Smith's team worked closely with Nancy Pelosi's partisan January 6 Committee, which destroyed critical records, yet the Special Counsel relied on its work to advance his own narrative and actions.

These hearings demonstrate why oversight is essential to ensure politically driven investigations do not undermine justice. Americans deserve transparency in their government, an understanding of the facts, and accountability.

Standing Up For Life




Last week, Americans from across the country gathered in Washington, D.C. for the annual March for Life, while just last weekend Wyomingites came together in Cheyenne for our own March for Life. These events are a powerful reminder that the pro-life movement is about more than politics, it is about compassion, dignity, and supporting both mothers and their children.

That same commitment guided my votes in the House this week. I proudly supported the Pregnant Students' Rights Act, which ensures students who are pregnant are not forced to choose between continuing their education and carrying a pregnancy to term. The bill requires colleges receiving federal funds to provide clear information about available resources, including pregnancy resource centers that offer free services such as ultrasounds, counseling, and essential supplies, especially important in rural states like Wyoming.

The House also passed the Supporting Pregnant and Parenting Women and Families Act, which protects pregnancy centers that serve nearly 2 million women and families each year. These organizations provide critical support, yet were targeted by the Biden administration through unlawful funding restrictions. Limiting resources for centers that help women and families choose life is wrong and harmful.

Fighting for Wyoming's Small Refiners and Jobs



Wyoming small refiners employ approximately 1,000 people and produce nearly 200,000 barrels of crude oil per day. They operate under a statutory exemption from the Renewable Fuel Standard, which mandates blending of transportation fuel with ethanol and biofuel, known as the Small Refinery Exemption (SRE). The SRE was designed to alleviate "disproportionate economic hardship" that mandating unnecessary "renewable" fuel blending would cause.

On the sidelines of the government funding discussions this week, there was an effort to narrow the SRE statute in a manner that will threaten all four Wyoming refineries, their employees, and their contribution to U.S. energy dominance. Not only would this policy be detrimental to small refiners across the country, but it was attempted without consultation with Wyoming, in an unrelated bill, and went through zero legislative process in this Congress.

I worked to avoid the inclusion of this policy in last week's bill and instead negotiated the creation of the Rural Domestic Energy Council to find a solution for the ethanol/biofuel states that does not hamper the operation of Wyoming's small refiners. I look forward to working with my colleagues to find ways to support all American energy producers.





