Staying Connected to Wyomingites



On Friday, I heard directly from constituents at a town hall in Washakie County. No matter what is happening in Washington, nothing replaces showing up, listening, and bringing Wyoming's priorities back to the Capitol with me.

Stripping the SPLC of Its Tax-Exempt Status

The House Judiciary Committee has spent months investigating the Southern Poverty Law Center after a bombshell indictment exposed the SPLC for what it is: a left-wing operation masquerading as a charity. The DOJ indicted the SPLC on 11 counts of wire fraud and money laundering. Federal prosecutors allege the organization secretly funneled over \$3 million in donor money to the very hate groups it claimed to be fighting, including the KKK and the American Nazi Party.

I joined Rep. Mark Harris and several House colleagues in a letter to Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent urging the IRS to revoke the SPLC's tax-free nonprofit status. They defamed mainstream conservative and Christian organizations such as the Family Research Council and Alliance Defending Freedom on a hate map alongside actual Klansmen, while ignoring violent left-wing groups like Antifa entirely. They fundraised off the chaos they helped create. That is not charity; it's fraud. The American taxpayer should not subsidize it.

Standing Up for Wyoming Parents

The Teton County Library Board recently passed a resolution opposing the Stop the Sexualization of Children Act, a bill I proudly cosponsored. They call it a book ban. That is simply not true, and

Wyoming parents deserve to know what this bill actually does.

The Stop the Sexualization of Children Act prohibits federal taxpayer dollars from funding programs or materials that promote sexually explicit content to children. The bill does not ban books or eliminate local control. Taxpayers should never be forced to pay for porn in school libraries.

The opposition wants to muddy the waters, but the facts are clear. Books like Gender Queer and All Boys Aren't Blue contain material so graphic that adults are cut off for reading passages aloud at school board meetings and on television. Yet critics insist these materials belong on school library shelves accessible to children.

Protecting children from age-inappropriate sexual content is not censorship. It is common sense, and I will not apologize for fighting for it.

Parents Deserve to Know What Their Kids Are Watching

I introduced a resolution calling on the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to modernize America's television content ratings system, so parents have the information they need to make informed decisions for their children.

The current ratings system was built for the broadcast era. It has not kept up with today's streaming landscape, and Hollywood knows it. A recent analysis of 326 Netflix series rated for young audiences found that 33% contained LGBTQ characters, themes, or messaging. Among shows rated for the youngest viewers, that number jumped to 41%. None of that is flagged for parents.

Streaming platforms are pushing ideology into children's programming and counting on parents not to notice.

My resolution calls on the FCC to require content descriptions that are clear, specific, and give parents a real seat at the table in how ratings are assigned and challenged, to ensure families can make practical use of parental controls. Eighty-seven percent of parents want ratings that tell them what is in a show before their kids watch it. This should not be a controversial ask.

The Bureau of Land Management is accepting public comments on an environmental review of wild horse and burro management tools through July 2, 2026. The review examines humane, science-based options to address overpopulation. The BLM estimates current herd sizes are more than three times what Western public lands can sustainably support.

Protecting Your Mail

Mail theft is a real threat, and the United States Postal Inspection Service wants Wyoming residents to know how to protect themselves. Pick up your mail promptly, never send cash through the mail, and notify your Post Office when you will be out of town. If you are expecting a check or other valuable item and it does not arrive, contact the issuing agency right away. You can also sign up for Informed Delivery at [USPS.com](https://usps.com) to receive daily email notifications of incoming mail and packages. If you suspect your mail has been stolen, call police immediately and then contact Postal Inspectors at 1-877-876-2455 or visit uspis.gov

One of the ways my office serves Wyomingites is by helping constituents navigate federal agencies.

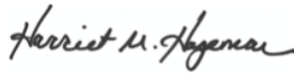
