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Hello Laura,

While I enjoyed my time in Wyoming, and completing 5 town halls throughout northern Wyoming, I returned to Washington, D.C. last week to continue working on your behalf. The House passed legislation to protect U.S. farmland from Chinese ownership and to prioritize our military and veterans—important steps for national security and to support those who have served.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) repeal of the Roadless Rule, a regulation I have long opposed, is a major win for Wyoming, providing better access and management for these valuable resources. I also joined Senators Barrasso and Lummis in introducing a bill to advance Wyoming's infrastructure priorities.

I look forward to being back in Wyoming to visit with constituents. Thank you for your continued engagement and support.

House Passes Bipartisan Bill to Secure American Farmland from China

The House unanimously passed H.R. 1713, the Agricultural Risk Review Act, which permanently adds the Secretary of Agriculture to the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States (CFIUS). CFIUS reviews the national security implications of foreign investments and advises the President on whether to block them. This legislation strengthens CFIUS's authority to review and block purchases of U.S. agricultural land by adversarial nations. In 2024, CFIUS blocked acquisition and ordered divestment of land near F.E. Warren Air Force Base in Wyoming by a majority Chinese-owned company.

Before 2024, CFIUS had no authority to evaluate foreign investments in farmland. While USDA was temporarily added to the committee last year, H.R. 1713 makes that role permanent. The bill also expands CFIUS's review authority to cover proposed transactions involving U.S. farmland, biotechnology, and other sensitive areas of the agriculture sector by entities from China, Russia, Iran, and North Korea. I am encouraged by the House's bipartisan, unanimous support of U.S. agriculture and national security and hope the Senate quickly takes up this important legislation.

USDA Secretary Rollins Repeals Burdensome Roadless Rule

On Monday, USDA Secretary Brooke Rollins started the process to revoke the Roadless Rule, a Clinton-era policy that restricted access, management, and use to 58.5 million acres of U.S. Forest Service land. Lifting these restrictions on road construction and timber harvesting will allow for active forest management, helping to improve forest health, battle insect infestations, reduce wildfire risks, and support job creation in logging, construction, and maintenance.

This is a significant win for Wyoming, where we saw horrific wildfires last year. The rule's repeal opens the door to better land and water stewardship and new economic opportunities across our state. I appreciate the Trump administration's continued focus on issues that matter to Wyoming, and I look forward to working together to ensure our government serves the people as it was meant to.

Delegation Introduces Bill to Fast-Track State Infrastructure Projects

I joined Senators Barrasso and Lummis in introducing the Small Projects Expedited Execution and Delivery (SPEED) Act, a commonsense bill aimed at cutting red tape and accelerating the delivery of critical surface transportation projects in Wyoming and across the nation. This legislation streamlines the federal permitting process, helping to reduce costly delays and get important infrastructure projects moving faster.

Specifically, the SPEED Act would ensure quicker environmental reviews, limit inflation-related setbacks, and ensure that more projects can break ground on time—resulting in better roads, stronger bridges, and improved connectivity for our rural and urban communities alike. As your representative, I remain committed to advancing practical solutions that support Wyoming's infrastructure, economy, and quality of life.

House Begins the Appropriations Process

The House officially began the 2026 appropriations process by passing the Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act—the first of twelve annual funding bills. This legislation fully funds veterans' healthcare, benefits, and VA programs, while also improving access to services through mileage reimbursement kiosks. It ensures taxpayer resources are protected by prohibiting the VA from processing medical claims for illegal aliens and purchasing resources from the Chinese Communist Party (CCP).

I was proud to support this bill, which honors our veterans, strengthens national security, and puts America first. I remain committed to advancing responsible, pro-American policies throughout the appropriations process.

Preserving U.S. Sovereignty and Restoring Congressional Authority

I joined Rep. Tom Tiffany (R-WI) and eight House Republicans to reintroduce the No WHO Pandemic Preparedness Treaty Without Senate Approval Act. This bill would require any WHO agreement to be designated as a treaty, needing Senate approval before the U.S. can be bound by it.

The COVID-19 pandemic showed us that funneling billions of taxpayer dollars to the WHO—an organization that doesn't prioritize American interests—is unwise. In 2019, the U.S. contributed about \$890 million, while countries like China contributed far less, despite evidence of CCP influence over the WHO.

President Trump took steps to withdraw from the WHO, but the Biden administration reversed that. While Trump has again ordered U.S. divestment, this bill ensures no future administration can rejoin the WHO without Congressional consent.

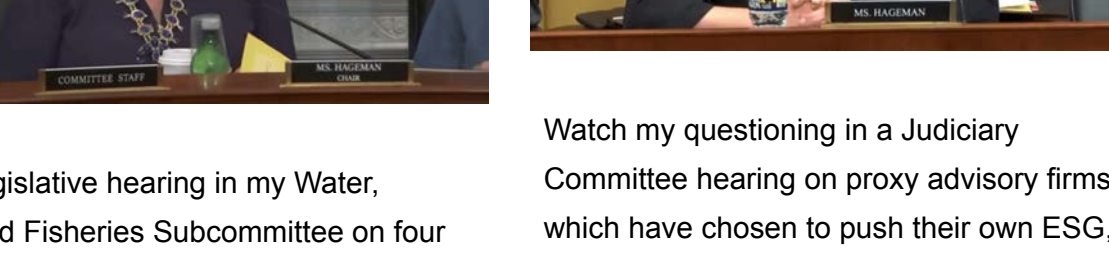

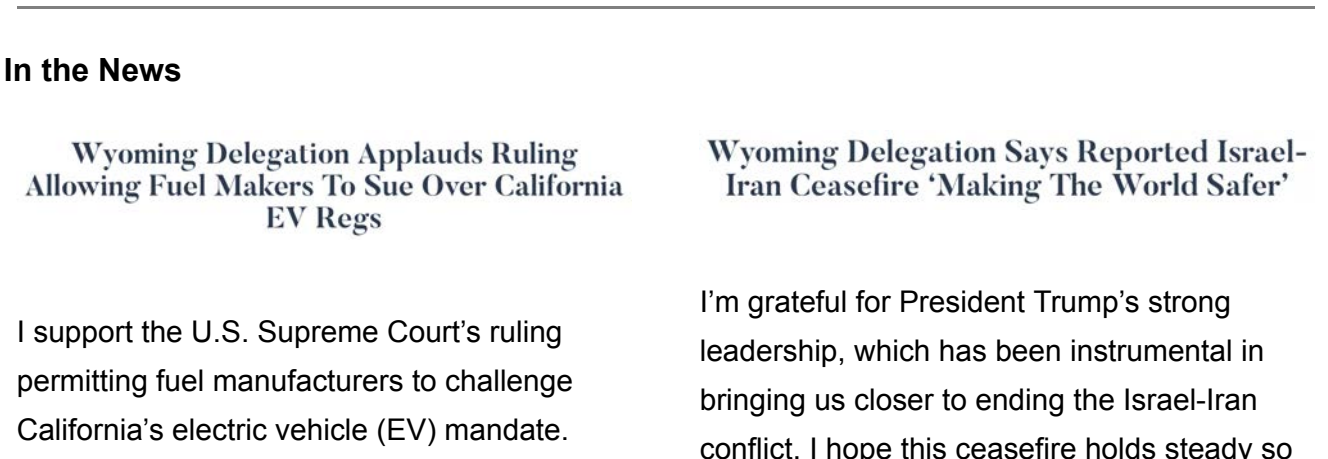

THIS is what REAL leadership looks like. A visual representation of @POTUS impact at the border:

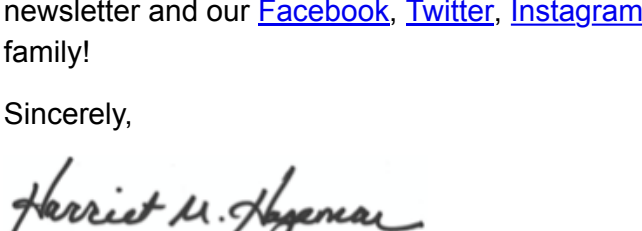

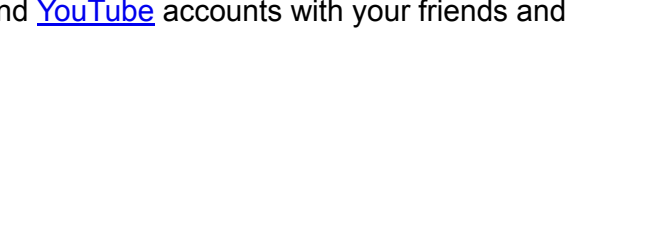
