It's been another busy week in Wyoming! After over 850 miles of driving and multiple events in 4 counties, I'm headed back to Washington for more committee hearings and crucial legislative votes, chief among them is H.R. 5, the Parents Bill of Rights, and H.R. 1, the Lower Energy Costs Act.

While I'm returning to Washington for the next two weeks, my district staff are starting their "Congress in Your Community" tour, and will be hosting mobile office hours in 8 counties. ## Fulfilling Our "Commitment to America"

When Republicans took control of the House this year, we made a commitment to restore your voice in Congress and return our nation to a state of safety, prosperity, and liberty. Over the next two weeks, we will debate and vote on two bills intended to do just that.

H.R. 1, the [Lower Energy Costs Act](#), aims to unleash American energy and lower the Biden Administration's drain on your pocketbook. In the past two years, the Biden Administration has executed an all-out war on American energy, forcing you to choose between driving to work and putting food on your table.

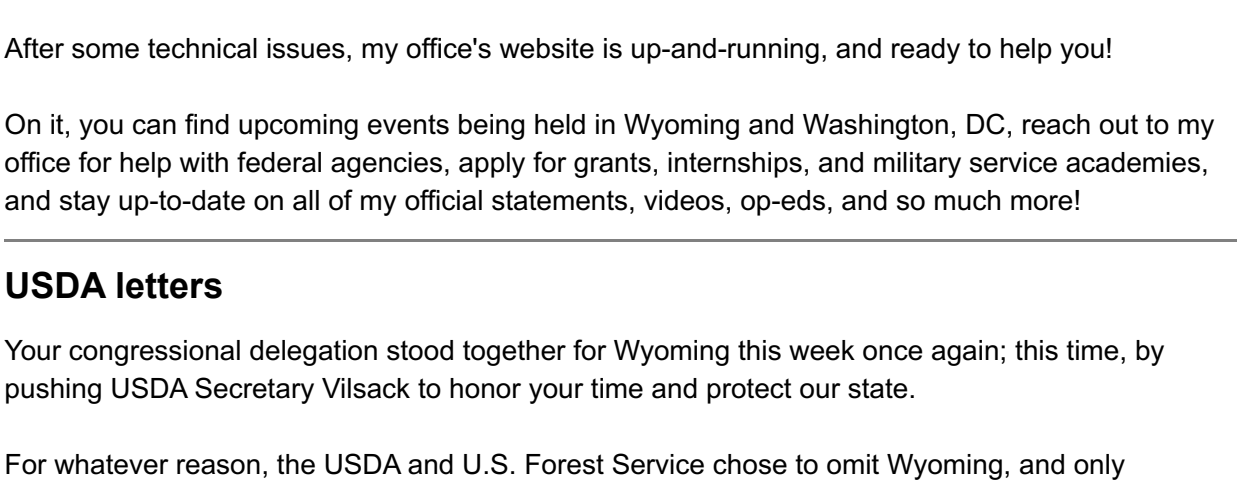
This bill, [which I co-sponsored](#) and includes my COAL Act, seeks to 1) **increase** domestic energy production, 2) **reform** the current permitting process for energy-related industries, 3) **reverse** the Biden Administration's anti-energy policies, 4) **streamline** energy infrastructure and exports, and 5) **boost** production and processing of critical minerals.

H.R. 5, the [Parents Bill of Rights](#), seeks to return parental input in our education system and ensure a promising future for our children. We believe that parents have:

- The right to know what's being taught in schools and to see reading material
- The right to be heard
- The right to see school budgets and spending reports
- The right to protect their child's privacy
- The right to be updated on any violent activity at their child's school

## USDA letters

Your congressional delegation stood together for Wyoming this week once again; this time, by pushing USDA Secretary Vilsack to honor your time and protect our state.

For whatever reason, the USDA and U.S. Forest Service chose to omit Wyoming, and only Wyoming, from their 10-year strategy to combat wildfires across the American West, and excluded Wyoming from their Congressionally-mandated wildfire commission. Wyoming is home to countless national treasures, critical energy resources, and wonderful communities, all of which are placed at extreme risk of disaster by this failure and neglect.

Yet the USDA's failure to prepare doesn't mean we will not fight to protect Wyoming. This week I co-sponsored the Forest Protection and Wildland Firefighter Safety Act (H.R. 1586), which would provide an exception in the Clean Water Act to ensure firefighters are able to use highly-effective fire retardants on wildfires. We also know that many of you are extremely busy this calving season, and on March 17, at our request, Secretary Vilsack extended the comment period for USDA's new electronic identification eartag rule for 30 more days. Without your input, USDA employees and bureaucrats can't understand the full effect their regulations will have, especially on items such as this proposed rule that disproportionately affect Wyoming ranchers. ## Town Hall (And Other) Highlights

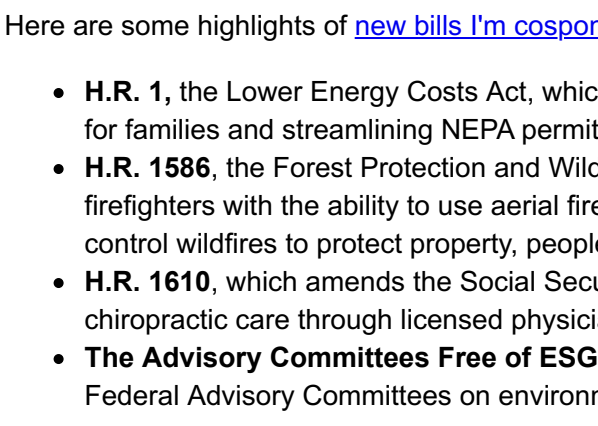

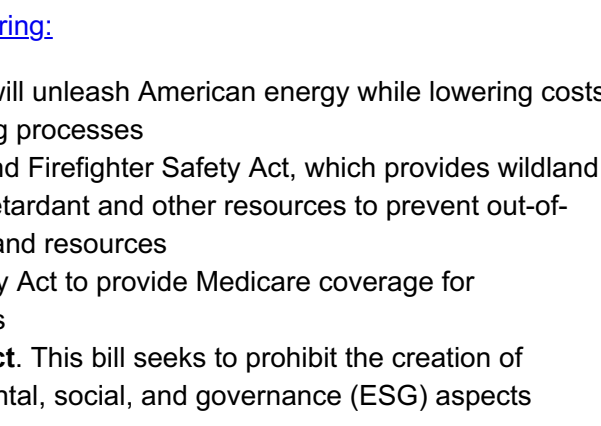

## Cosponsored Legislation

Here are some highlights of [new bills I'm cosponsoring](#):

- **H.R. 1**, the Lower Energy Costs Act, which will unleash American energy while lowering costs for families and streamlining NEPA permitting processes
- **H.R. 1586**, the Forest Protection and Wildland Firefighter Safety Act, which provides wildland firefighters with the ability to use aerial fire retardant and other resources to prevent out-of-control wildfires to protect property, people, and resources
- **H.R. 1610**, which amends the Social Security Act to provide Medicare coverage for chiropractic care through licensed physicians
- **The Advisory Committees Free of ESG Act**. This bill seeks to prohibit the creation of Federal Advisory Committees on environmental, social, and governance (ESG) aspects

## Supporting Wyoming Businesses



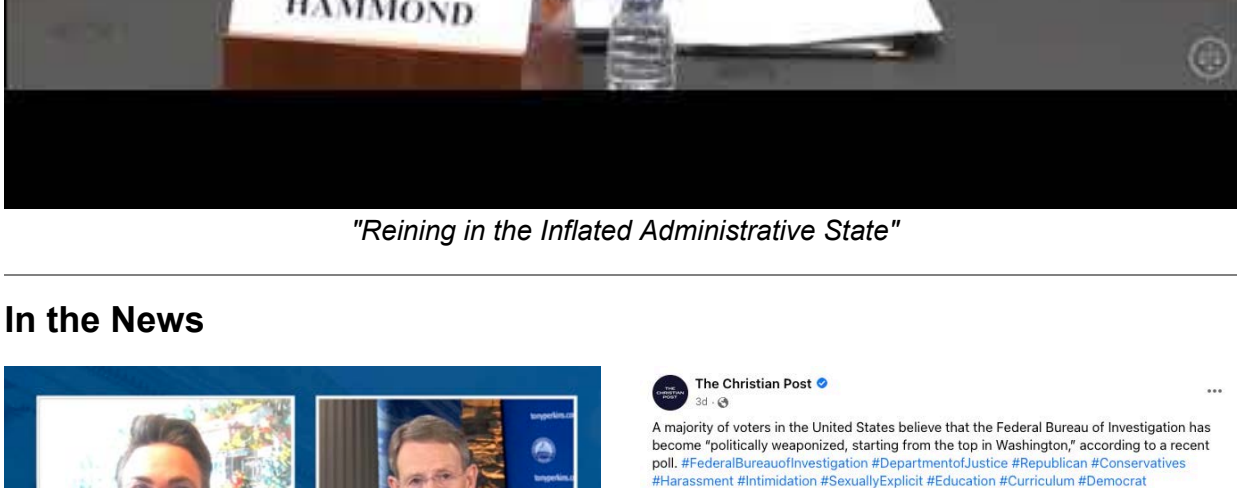
