I appreciate the opportunity to serve as Wyoming's lone congressional representative, and I am excited to share my biggest priorities and accomplishments of the past week. It is called accountability, and it is important that we hold all of our public officials and employees to this standard.

We had a busy and productive week, with the House of Representatives passing our budget resolution (which I supported). I chaired the first official meetings of both the Article I Task Force and Anti-Woke Caucus, and I participated in hearings in the Judiciary and Natural Resources Committees. I also joined Senators Barrasso and Lummis in hosting our first Wyoming Wednesday of 2025, having the opportunity to meet with many constituents both at this event and in my office. I also wanted to provide you with the latest update on the Corporate Transparency Act (CTA). I am pleased to report that the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) announced on Thursday that it is suspending the March 21, 2025, deadline for small businesses to report their beneficial ownership information and will not issue fines or penalties for failure to file or update reports. ## House Passes Republican Budget Resolution

I have received some calls and messages from constituents on the budget resolution which I voted in favor of last week. Many of my callers have alleged that this bill makes significant cuts to Medicare and Medicaid. I wanted to inform you that this allegation is simply untrue—while Congress is discussing how we can best reform these programs to provide the best care for those truly in need, this resolution does not make any cuts or create any new spending. The bill is instead a roadmap for future budget considerations and steps.


This resolution provides a critical blueprint that lays out House Republicans' fiscal priorities and begins the reconciliation process, which are two critical steps to fulfilling our commitments to the American people. I am personally working to ensure that the final reconciliation package includes measures to unravel the Environmental Protection Agency's costly, wasteful, and不可靠的 green mandates; to empower Congress to impose real constraints on the power of the administrative state; and to secure the border and deport criminal illegal aliens. This is how we pave the way for a stronger Wyoming and more prosperous America—by turning the voters' mandate into real and lasting legislative action.

## Countering the Administrative State and a Woke Agenda

On Wednesday, I chaired the first official meeting of the Article I Task Force, which I am leading this Congress to guide our mission to reclaim the legislative authority in the wake of the overturning of the 1984 Chevron decision. We invited two of the lawyers involved in the Supreme Court case that ended Chevron deference and another legal expert in the field of administrative law. These three attorneys discussed and dissected the Supreme Court's decision and described how Congress can seize this moment to restore the Constitutional mandate of separation of powers. This task force operates under the Republican Study Committee, and it is our intention for this conservative entity to lead the way in reigning in the administrative state and re-professionalizing the institution of Congress. We need to become better legislative practitioners, thereby limiting the power of both unelected bureaucrats to rewrite the law through regulations and to constrain the courts to enforce the law as written rather than how it may be interpreted.

As Chair of the Anti-Woke Caucus, I also held a legislative strategy session with several experts to develop ideas for how Congress can use the budget reconciliation process to expose and root out the "woke" agenda from the federal government. Reconciliation is the opportunity to deliver the Republican trifecta's agenda, and we would be remiss if we did not add countering the woke agenda as a top priority. I am excited to work with my colleagues on this caucus to deliver important wins for common sense, rational thought, and adherence to the Constitution and the American people.




