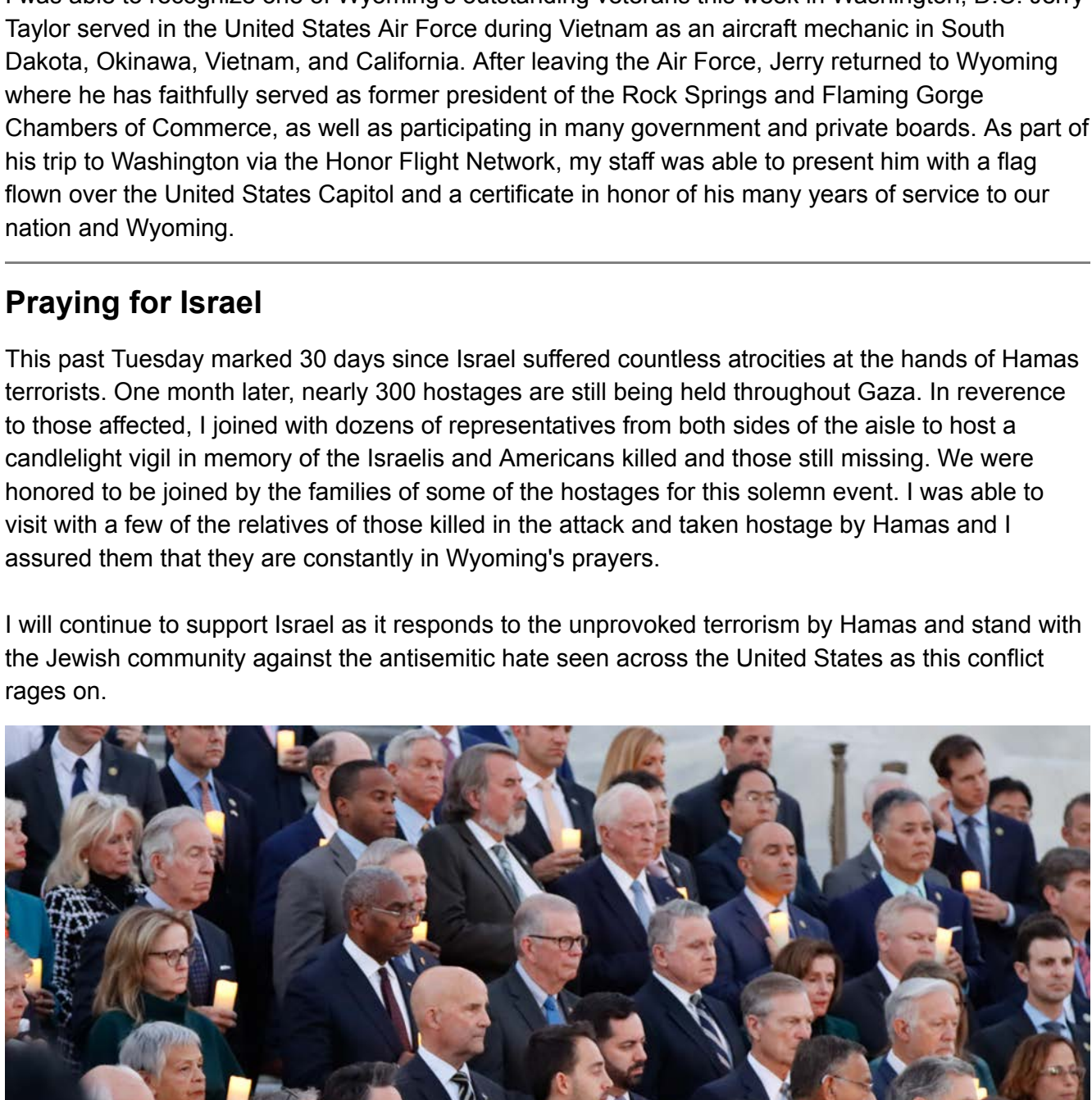
Appropriations Update

The House continued to debate FY24 appropriations this week, including some of my amendments to the Transportation and Housing and Urban Development appropriations bill.

We continue to put forward fiscally-sound, common-sense legislation that reduces the profligate federal spending from the last few years, reins in out of control agencies, and places our country on a better financial footing. Here's an update on my amendments to the bill.

- Amendments #43 and 57 prohibit the use of federal funds for remote work agreements for Department of Transportation employees and for Housing and Urban Development employees residing within 50 miles of a HUD office.
- Includes my amendment, which directs \$5 million of the FAA's funds toward increasing the aviation maintenance technician development program.
- I also supported an amendment from my dear friend Thomas Massie that would have blocked an effort to mandate vehicle kill switches in all U.S. cars manufactured after 2025. These switches are advertised as a way to prevent impaired driving, but this vague mandate contains no firm details on who will be able to access the data used by these switches, how they will operate, or what will happen if the system malfunctions. This also raises serious questions about privacy and other fundamental liberties. This mandate simply contains too many unknowns and potential constitutional violations to allow this program to proceed without answers to these important questions. Unfortunately, colleagues from both sides of the aisle sided with the Biden Administration to keep this deeply flawed – and likely unconstitutional – program in place.

Celebrating our Veterans



We owe an immense debt to our American veterans. These men and women have missed birthdays, graduations, weddings, funerals, and the everyday blessings of life with their families, all in service to our nation. They have willingly gone into harm's way, lived in austere places far from home, and made countless sacrifices to keep us safe and preserve our way of life. I am committed to ensuring our veterans receive the care, benefits, and assistance they so richly deserve. There are no words that can fully express our gratitude, so I will simply and humbly say thank you.

I was able to recognize one of Wyoming's outstanding veterans this week in Washington, D.C. Jerry Taylor served in the United States Air Force during Vietnam as an aircraft mechanic in South Dakota, Okinawa, Vietnam, and California. After leaving the Air Force, Jerry returned to Wyoming where he has faithfully served as former president of the Rock Springs and Flaming Gorge Chambers of Commerce, as well as participating in many government and private boards. As part of his trip to Washington via the Honor Flight Network, my staff was able to present him with a flag flown over the United States Capitol and a certificate in honor of his many years of service to our nation and Wyoming.

Praying for Israel

This past Tuesday marked 30 days since Israel suffered countless atrocities at the hands of Hamas terrorists. One month later, nearly 300 hostages are still being held throughout Gaza. In reverence to those affected, I joined with dozens of representatives from both sides of the aisle to host a candlelight vigil in memory of the Israelis and Americans killed and those still missing. We were honored to be joined by the families of some of the hostages for this solemn event. I was able to visit with a few of the relatives of those killed in the attack and taken hostage by Hamas and I assured them that they are constantly in Wyoming's prayers.

I will continue to support Israel as it responds to the unprovoked terrorism by Hamas and stand with the Jewish community against the antisemitic hate seen across the United States as this conflict rages on.



Ensuring That All College Students Have the Right to Free Speech

Since the Hamas terror attack, there has been a surge of protests on college campuses, with many of these instances voicing support for these terrorists, calling for Israel's destruction, and proclaiming opposition to their Jewish peers. What's worse, these pro-Palestine movements have exceeded the protections of the First Amendment as they seek to block Jewish and pro-Israel students from speaking and use threats of violence to remove them from the campuses. This despicable response to the Hamas attacks is the unfortunate result of years of attacks on free speech rights on college campuses. Rogue, politically motivated administrators, and students empowered through their manipulation and indoctrination, have undermined the free speech protections fundamental to a meaningful education.

The Left has tightened its grip on many of our American universities, in part by labeling any opposing viewpoints as violence to justify their censorship. This repression has led to the blocking of conservative speakers, prohibition of conservative student groups from meeting, and attacks by angry mobs. This breakdown in free speech rights has often been encouraged by the universities themselves – both in the administration and in the classroom. It is this system that has created an atmosphere of fear, intimidation and hate, with many schools refusing to do anything about attacks on those individuals and students who have not bought into the radical liberal agenda – those who support Israel, those who believe that men should not compete in women's sports, those who refuse to reject biology, those who live by their Christian faith.

Considering the dramatic uptick in attacks on our rights as guaranteed by the First Amendment, the House Judiciary Committee held a hearing on the breakdown of free speech on college campuses and the implication for the constitutional rights of Americans. Three brave students spoke to our Committee about their experiences facing discrimination, describing the numerous ways in which their free speech rights have been violated simply because of their Jewish heritage or conservative views in this new culture on college campuses which are antithetical to the Constitution. 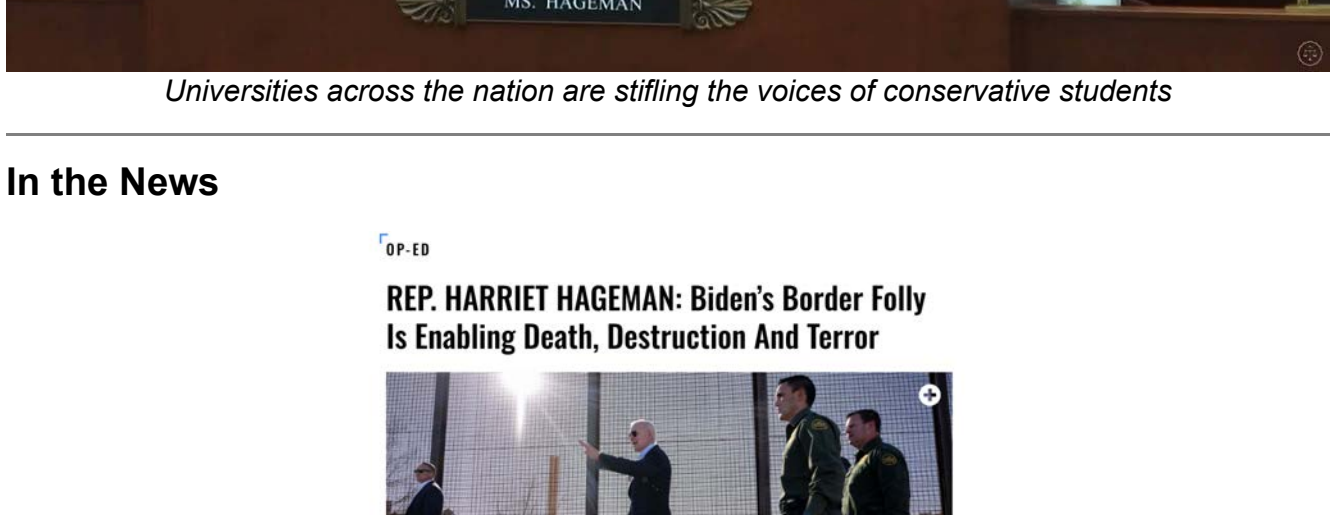

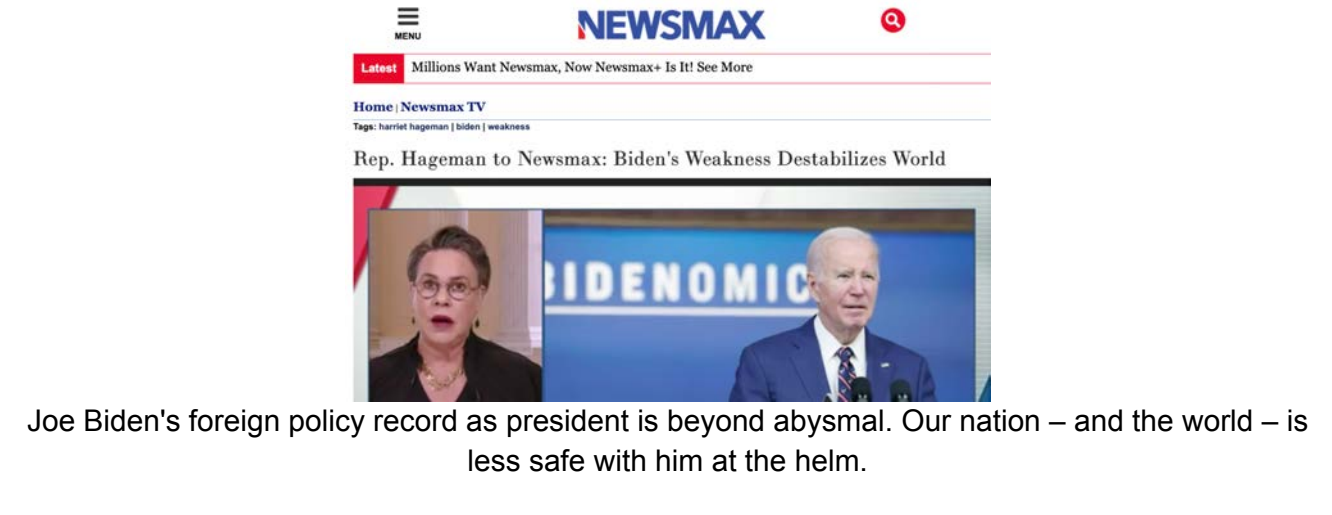

Thank you to Jerry Taylor and all of Wyoming's veterans for your selfless service to our state and nation! You exemplify what it means to be an American.

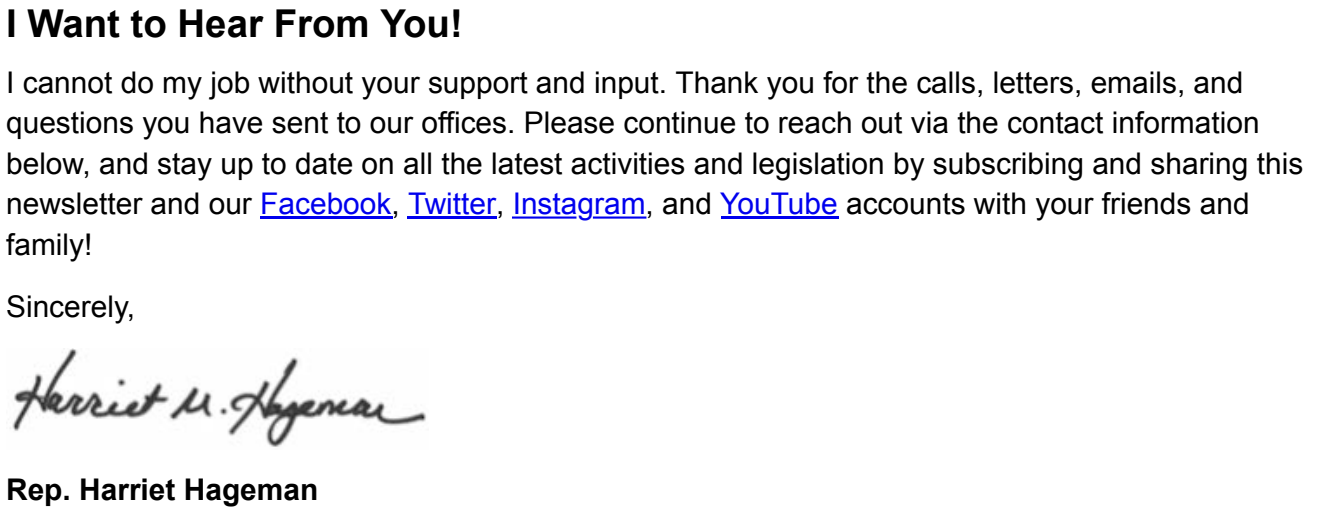


Casper is being considered as the next home of the Reno Air Races! My staff were able to meet with representatives of the Reno Air Racing Association to tour the airport's grounds.
