Introducing the FAIR Act

Over the last several years, our nation has seen incredible advances in artificial intelligence (AI) and other high-tech systems. These innovations can dramatically increase efficiency, drive prosperity, and solve problems once thought intractable. We must provide guardrails to ensure that these tools are not used as vehicles for ideological indoctrination or partisan spin under the guise of progress, a threat we are seeing already.

This is why I'm introducing the [FAIR Act](#) to codify the principle that the federal government must only use AI that is truthful when asked facts or for analysis, respects historical and scientific integrity, acknowledges when information is incomplete or in dispute, and remains strictly neutral without bending to any social or political agendas.

By codifying President Trump's Executive Order, the FAIR Act makes clear that we will not accept AI systems that distort our history or obscure the truth under so-called "inclusivity" or "diversity" labels. I believe this is critical to preserve public trust in government and to keep America strong, free, and grounded in reality.

Natural Resources Committee Starts Permitting Reform Discussions

The 119th Congress made monumental strides for Wyoming's energy industries through the One Big Beautiful Bill Act. But our outdated, broken permitting systems stand in the way of truly maximizing the bill's benefits, and restrict America's ability to maximize our energy development, to modernize our infrastructure, and innovate within our industries at a time when such innovation is desperately needed. This is the time to act to update our permitting systems, to adapt our new technologies to meet our needs, and to ensure that we remain ahead of China in relation to our critical industries and resources.

In May, the Supreme Court ruling in [Seven Counties Infrastructure Coalition v. Eagle County, Colorado](#) reaffirmed the very purpose and scope of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) after decades of misinterpretation, distortion, and expansion by the courts and various presidential administrations. As Justice Kavanaugh wrote in the decision, "NEPA has transformed from a modest procedural requirement into a blunt and haphazard tool employed by project opponents (who may not always be entirely motivated by concern for the environment) to try to stop or at least slow down new infrastructure and construction projects."

I am a joint sponsor of the bipartisan [SPEED Act](#), which codifies and furthers the relief described by the Court in the [Seven Counties](#) decision, reaffirming the procedural nature of NEPA, reforming judicial review, and streamlining the process. Last week, the Natural Resources Committee took the first step to advance this bill, holding a legislative hearing in which two panels of outside experts discussed the need for this legislation.

House Passes the National Defense Authorization Act

The National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) is the annual defense policy bill through which Congress carries out its constitutional defense authority. This law has been passed into law 64 years in a row. As for the latest iteration, the House moved first to pass its version of the legislation, which I was proud to support.

The 2025 NDAA bill authorizes a 3.8% pay raise for all servicemembers, improves benefits for military families, codifies 15 Trump Executive Orders, supports Department of Defense (DoD) border security operations, and makes further reforms to end the politicization of our armed forces.

I am also proud to be part of a bipartisan coalition that worked together to attach a provision repealing the 1991 and 2002 authorizations to use military force (AUMFs) governing our two Iraq wars. Those missions are long over in Iraq, yet these AUMFs remain on the books, thereby deflecting efforts to wind down the U.S. presence in the Middle East, which we must do so we can refocus our defense system on competition with China.

Since taking office in 2023, I have worked with this bipartisan coalition to advance this much-needed reform, but it was not until this week that Congress spoke to reclaim its war power authority, and I am proud to announce the repeal of these Iraq AUMFs passed in the House version of the NDAA.


Small Business Relief Update

I am also excited to report a major win in our fight to protect small businesses from the Biden administration's efforts to force them into a paperwork and compliance nightmare. FinCEN has announced that it will destroy the "Beneficial Ownership Information" (BOI) data already submitted under the so-called Corporate Transparency Act (CTA) and issue a final rule by the end of this year. This follows years of work on Capitol Hill, in the courts, and with NFIB to reverse an unconstitutional, invasive rule that unfairly burdened Main Street and was reflective more of "Big Brother" than good governance and protecting our financial systems.

FinCEN's announcement came hours after receipt of a [letter](#) I co-signed, led by Sen. Jim Banks and Congressman Warren Davidson, which urged FinCEN to delete the data previously submitted and to expedite the final rule that would exempt U.S. small businesses from BOI reporting requirements.

I have been one of the leaders fighting the CTA and its overregulation and am pleased that this administration listened to our concerns. I will keep pushing for strong privacy protections and for laws that defend hardworking Wyoming businesses rather than punish them.

Wyoming Coal Combustion Residuals Permit Program

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is proposing to approve the Wyoming coal combustion residuals (CCR) permit program under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA). The draft list proposes the inclusion of six new minerals. I am incredibly pleased that potash is proposed for inclusion in the updated list. Potash is primarily used as an agricultural fertilizer and a mineral I have urged the Department of the Interior to include, and [even supported legislation](#) to add potash to the critical mineral list.

Department of the Interior Reopens Regulatory Reform Comment Period

In May, the Department of the Interior (DOI) issued a request for information on DOI Regulatory Reform. While the original comment deadline ended this summer, the [DOI announced on Tuesday that it was reopening](#) this comment period indefinitely.

Department of Agriculture Initiates EIS Concerning Management of Inventoried Roadless Areas

Recently, [the USDA took the next step](#) in the rulemaking process for rescinding the 2001 Roadless Rule by opening a public comment period. Comments must be received in writing by September 19, 2025. The proposed rule, accompanied by a draft EIS, is expected by March 2026, along with a request for additional public comment. The final rule, EIS, and record of decision are expected to be released in late 2026.

Veterans' Rock is Looking for Volunteers






I have no doubt that this bright group of students will represent Wyoming well at the convention.



